Agriculture Focus

Chiggers in Kansas

Warmer days may lead many to itch for spring and summer, but a K-State entomologist cautions against a small mite that is likely to give you a less-pleasing seasonal itch.

Chiggers are active beginning in April, says



K-State's Raymond Cloyd, and are usually found in areas with unmanaged vegetation, as well as parks, golf courses, sports fields and other grassy areas. The larvae attach themselves to humans, pets and other animals.

"Chiggers do not suck blood," Cloyd said. "Rather, chiggers burrow and feed on dissolved skin. The larvae inject a saliva that causes the skin tissue to dissolve, and that is what the chigger larvae feed on."

According to Cloyd, the larvae are difficult to see with the human eye. Humans often notice the presence of chiggers by a reddish-rash and itchy skin.

Cloyd cautions to resist the urge to scratch.

"You want to avoid scratching too often because you can promote a bacterial infection by opening wounds," he said. "I've been bitten by chiggers many times, and I know it's very tempting to scratch, but you don't want to create a bigger problem."

Cloyd said some topical ointments may help with the itch and a dermatologist may be able to provide recommendations.

Once attached, larvae feed for "a few days," according to Cloyd, and then they fall off the host. The larvae become nymphs and then adults that reside in the soil. The nymphs and adults do not feed on humans or other animals. Instead, they feed on insects, mites, and their eggs in the soil.

The best advice, according to Cloyd, is to avoid

getting bitten in the first place.

"If you're going to go into an area where chiggers are likely to be, use DEET or other repellants, and then when you come back inside, immediately take a shower to help reduce the itchiness caused by chiggers."

Chiggers are usually active from Spring (late April) until Fall, or until the first frost. The species of chiggers found in Kansas do not transmit disease, Cloyd said.

Cloyd has written a publication, titled Chiggers in Kansas, with additional tips for protecting yourself from chiggers, including:

Avoid walking into areas with tall grass and weeds.

Do not sit, lie down or walk barefoot in areas that may harbor chiggers.

Insert pant legs underneath socks.

Mow turfgrass regularly and remove extensive vegetation, such as brush, shrubs, grass and weeds).

Wash clothes using a hot water wash and rinse to kills chiggers that may be attached to clothing.

Consult a physician about products that can be used to relieve discomfort and itching.

The H5N1 Bird Flu (Avian Influenza A) is affecting egg supplies across the country. Currently, there is no person-to-person spread of the virus and public health risk is low.

Getting Started with Home Food Preservation

In home canning, <u>botulism</u> illness from *Clostridium botulinum* bacteria, is rare, but it can happen if unsafe methods and untested recipes are used. Foodborne botulism does not spread from person to person, it comes directly from food. Get started on the path to safe home canned foods with these tips:

 Learn how to use equipment properly. Practice by canning water to learn how your stovetop works with the canner. Read canner and stove manufacturer instructions. Follow <u>reliable recipes</u>. They will safely guide you through the steps and also tell you how to <u>adjust processing for your elevation</u>.

Use the proper canning method for the food being canned. High acid foods can be safely canned in a <u>water bath canner</u>. Low acid foods must be canned in a <u>pressure canner</u>.

Let the Easter Egg Hunt Begin!

Sometimes eggs are decorated, used as decorations, and hunted at Easter. Here are some safety tips.

- Dyeing eggs: After hard cooking eggs, dye them and refrigerate within 2 hours. Use a food-safe coloring.
- Blowing out eggshells: Use caution when blowing out the contents to hollow out the shell for decorating. Use eggs that have been kept refrigerated and are uncracked. To destroy bacteria that may be present on the surface of the egg, wash the egg in hot water and then rinse in a solution of 1 teaspoon liquid chlorine bleach per half cup of water. After blowing out the egg, refrigerate the contents and use within 2 to 4 days.
- Hunting Eggs: If hard cooked eggs have been lying on the ground, they can pick up bacteria, especially if the shells are cracked. If the shells crack, bacteria could contaminate the inside. The total time for hiding and hunting eggs should not exceed 2 hours. Refrigerate and use "found" eggs within 7 days of cooking.

YQCA Training Required for all Livestock Participants

The Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certification training will be required for 4-H members ages 8-18 to be able to show and sell their livestock this year for fair. 7 year-olds are encouraged to attend, but will not become certified. Species that require certification include beef, hogs, sheep, goats, poultry and rabbits. This training focuses on food safety, animal well-being, and life skill development. The office will be hosting two in-person dates for members to receive their certificate. If they cannot attend either in-person date they are able to complete the training online. The first training will be Thursday, April 24th at 6:30pm at the 4-H Building and the second will be Sunday, June 1st at 2:00pm location TBD. The training will be \$3/ participant in-person or \$12 online. All online certificates of completion are due to the office by July 1st.
